What is bullying?




Bullying is: 'deliberate, hurtful behaviour which is repeated and where there is an imbalance of power

Bullying in more detail

- Bullying is **deliberate**, where a person **hurts** someone on purpose it is not an accident.
- Bullying is **repetitive**, where a person hurts someone over and over again, it doesn't just happen once.
- Bullying is where one person acts like they have more **power** than another, and does whatever they can to hurt that person.



Digital facts

• The 'generational digital divide' that exists between children and their parents.


 93% of young people in the UK now have access to a tablet, computer or mobile phone

 69% of parents add their children to their Facebook friends

Digital risks

- 12% of 11–16 year olds in the UK have received an unwanted sexual message/image online
- 88% of images young people put online reappear on 'parasite website'
- 58% of young women in a recent poll said that Facebook was more important than their parents

 How does it differ from other forms of bullying?



Cyber-bullying is.....

'the use of Information Communication Technology (ICT), particularly mobile phones and the Internet, to deliberately hurt someone....'

How does it differ?

- Cyber-bullying is not face-to-face
- The person doing the bullying may be unaware of the consequences of their actions.

 The person doing the bullying might try and hide who they are

How does it differ?

 Cyber-bullying can reach large audiences very quickly

 Most cyber-bullying takes place outside of school in the community.

Your child will not tell you about a problem if they feel you will restrict their access to digital technologies.

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
